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Potentate's Message



Hello again Nobles, Ladies, friends all. It's that Christmas time of year again. I realize some of you may be reading this after December 25. However, many places of the world including Scotland, England the Amish community and even in the Southern part of my county celebrate Christmas much later on January 7th. In some cases for up to forty days later.

This later date called "Old Christmas" is sometimes associated with twelve days of feasting or twelve days of Christmas. In early times, the calendar was based upon the phases of the moon and was therefore not very accurate. However, Julius Caesar initiated a calendar based upon the sun whereby a year was divided into 365 and one quarter days which was divided further by twelve months. This resulted in an over estimation by eleven minutes fifteen seconds and which would result in one day every one hundred and twenty eight years. Therefore by the 16th century the calendar was about eleven days off. So in 1582 Pope Gregory the XIII directed that the Julian calendar be replaced with his calendar which would change the dates and the extra eleven days were simply deleted. But Protestant Europe would not let the Pope dictate, so many continued to celebrate the old calendar. Not without understanding this bit of arcane history, many celebrate Christmas later, including the community of Rodanthe which celebrates "Old Christmas" complete with an oyster feast and "Old Buck", a deer like costume for two or more. Legend holds that Old Buck impregnated all the cows on Hatteras Island until he was finally shot. Now his ghost reappears – and anyone he touches has good luck.

At any event, regardless of when it's celebrated, the holiday season represents a special time of year when we all tend to become more sensitive and caring about the needs and concerns of others especially those less fortunate in terms of health or wealth. This is sometimes referred to as the "Christmas spirit". Just as those in Rodanthe celebrate two Christmases why couldn't we have the Christmas spirit throughout the year?

I remember when I was about seven years old, my Dad at whose side I was always ever present, was going to town on cold windy Nor'easter two days before Christmas to check on the school buses over which he had charge. Enroute we noticed on the opposite side of the road heading in the other direction a teenage miscreant named Mark with arm out stretched and thumb aloft hitchhiking or "thumbing" as we said in the familiar patios of the day. Mark was known around the community as hailing from

a somewhat dysfunctional family. Dad would occasionally invite him to church, to Royal Ranger camping trips or Boy Scout events. He was prone to be slow of speech; wearing dirty, grimy clothes, with greasy hair and he often smelled. On this cold occasion Dad turned around and pulled up alongside of Mark and ask where he was going. "Anywhere but here" was the answer "especially if it's warm in there". We took Mark back to town with us in the opposite direction. Daddy called his friend who ran a family pharmacy and general store from which you could acquire anything from appliances, hardware, clothes and limited gifts. That evening Dad bought gifts for Mark including a canteen, camping knife a nice warm flannel coat, some canvas overalls and a harmonica. A pretty good Christmas for that time. We took Mark home with us for dinner (Mama always prepared extra). This was followed by homemade ice cream around the tree as we watched Christmas specials on the black and white TV. That year we celebrated an impromptu Christmas two days early. Dad said Christmas is about celebrating the birth of Jesus and giving to others and that can be anytime. He would often say "the best gift you'll ever get is the one you give away".

I'm prompted to the recollection of this event by a story I recently read by Brian Joseph, entitled The Giving Gift. In it the author chronicles a history of giving and lessons learned. At age five the boy is requested by his mother to donate one of his presents to a poor child. Reluctantly he agrees after his mother explains that sharing with those in need is really what the holiday spirit was about. The boy donated a toy truck with a note requesting that it be given to a kid "who doesn't have a lot of toys". A few years later the boy uses eeny-meny-miny-mo as a process to select a gift of checkers which would be donated. Three months later he is surprised to see this checkers set at his friend Jerry's house. At age ten the local laundry mat where his mother worked closed and gifts that year were sparse. His mother told the boy that he didn't have to donate that year. But remembering the blessed feeling he got from seeing his friend Jerry play with the re-gifted checkers the boy decided to give his new football. A few months later his mother asked for a football for her birthday. Only after reaching adulthood does the boy reflect upon the many less intrinsic rewards derived from giving; and that although in reality his family was "poor" themselves, "the greatest poverty is poverty of the soul". This story comes full circle after the now grown man explains to his five year old son that "the best gift didn't come in a box, and wasn't wrapped". He is delayed in going to make his annual gift when his son asks him for help in writing a note for his own donation.

Of course there is joy in watching the faces of children as they open gifts at Christmas or other times. As Mr. Joseph said "material gifts can be precious but the greatest gift that we can give our children aren't wrapped in fancy paper and they can't be purchased at the mall, the greatest gifts

For the election of Potentate, Divan Officers, Trustees, Imperial Council Representatives, SASA Representatives and New Candidates: the 2016 Budget Approval, and the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the temple.

Imperial Bylaws Article 325.11: Election Regulations

- (a) **Electioneering.** A candidate for an elected office in a Shrine temple may print, publish and circulate during the year he is seeking the elected office, a resume' consisting of his educational background, his vocational history, and his Masonic and Shrine record. Except as provided in the prior sentence, the printing, publication, circulating or distribution of resolutions, letters, telegrams, tickets, email or other devices, by a unit, club, noble, or group of nobles, suggesting, recommending, opposing, or containing the names of proposed candidates for office in the temple is prohibited.
- (b) **Expenditure Prohibited.** The expenditure of money for gifts, favors, or entertainment on behalf of a candidate for elected office is prohibited.
- (c) **Violation.** For any violation of (a) or (b), the Imperial Potentate may suspend any offending noble, and he may declare the election of the officers void and order a new election.
- (d) **Notice.** At least one week prior to the annual meeting or any election, the temple Recorder shall mail to each member a notice thereof containing this section.

We were blessed to be able to actually see the results of the care from The Shriners Hospital in our grandchildren's lives and there are not words to express our gratitude to them and their organization.

People that live in our neighborhood, go to church with us, shop in the grocery store with us and are a part of our community are dedicated Shriners that are blending into our society every day.

The building that they have on Highway 70 is a physical structure that represents a group of loving, giving people that truly care about our world and the hurting people in it. Our family has truly seen who the Shriners really are and we have been forever blessed by them. 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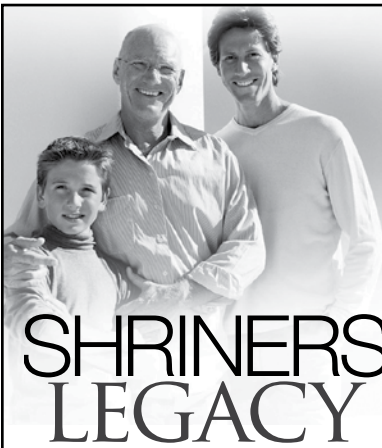

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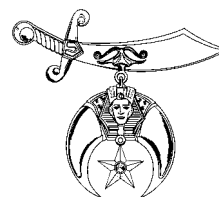

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The Importance of Positive Communication to Children with Disabilities

The Power of Language

Our word choices have a tremendous impact on those around us. Children, especially, are deeply influenced by the language surrounding them – who they become is based on who they are learning to be. The staff of Shriners Hospitals for Children® understands the importance of building confidence and self-esteem in our patients at an early age. Our staff recognizes that while working with children with disabilities, it is imperative to help them develop a strong positive attitude so they will have the confidence to pursue their dreams. To accomplish this, being mindful of the effect language has on children is critical.

Two essential points in using communication as affirmation are accurate wording and people-first language. Always remember to use language that encourages, rather than discourages, the individual. When referring to those with a disability, please remember to **avoid labels with a negative connotation**, such as:

- crippled
- handicapped
- lame
- deformed

» **The preferred word choice is usually:**

- disability
- disabled
- the actual term involved, such as, cerebral palsy or muscular dystrophy

People with Disabilities are People First

The second key element of communicating with people with disabilities is the need to use “people-first language,” where the person is the important element, rather than the disability.

For example, try using phrases such as “a person *with* cerebral palsy” or “a person *who uses* a prosthetic arm,” rather than defining them by the disability itself.

It is also important to recognize that people are individuals, and to **avoid lumping those with disabilities together into one group**, like “the disabled,” “the spinal cord injured,” or to refer to “all people with X.”

» Another important aspect of using people-first language is to **avoid negative descriptive phrases and terms**, such as:

- confined to a wheelchair
- wheelchair bound
- victim stricken with
- suffering

Instead, try saying a person “uses a wheelchair,” or “has cerebral palsy.”



“We must take language very seriously. The feeling I have is that language is always a reflection of attitude. With the advancement of the disability movement, you see a change in language.” – Michael Masutha

Also avoid **value-laden words and phrases**, whether negative or positive, because even seemingly positive labels such as “courageous” and “inspirational” can be burdensome to a child, setting unnecessary high expectations, that may be hard to maintain.

As part of using people-first language, it is also imperative to not define people by their disabilities. This is accomplished by **emphasizing abilities, not limitations**.

» For instance:

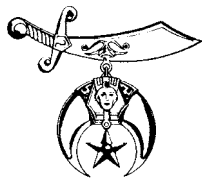
- Say: “Darlene is an excellent writer,” rather than, “Despite her disability, Darlene is an excellent writer.”
- Say, “Johnny is a child with a disability,” instead of the defining, “Johnny is a *disabled child*.”

Being mindful of preferred disability terminology and using people-first language whenever possible will help children with disabilities become more confident and able to become successful, productive adults.

SHRINE FUNDRAISING

POLICIES & PROCEDURES SHRINE FUNDRAISING

INTRODUCTION

Because Shriners have been the driving force behind Shriners Hospitals for Children, it has become natural to associate the Fez with this charity. However, the Shrine of North America and Shriners Hospitals are separate and distinct legal corporations.

Shriners Hospitals for Children is incorporated in the state of Colorado, and it operates 22 hospitals. Its purpose is to provide medical care to children with disabilities without regard to race, creed, sect or nationality. The treatment for the children is provided at no cost. This is the Charitable corporation.

The Shrine of North America is incorporated in the state of Iowa, and it presently has 195 unincorporated fraternal associations in Canada, Mexico, the United States and Republic of Panama. We know them as Shrine Temples. This is the Fraternal corporation.

A study done by Shriners International Headquarters found that Shrine Temples conduct more than 2,000 fundraising activities annually. Many of these fundraisers are strictly for the Temples – and this is perfectly acceptable. Other fundraising activities are for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children – and this is also perfectly acceptable.

However, the individual purchasing a ticket, product, etc., or the donor, should be advised, in advance, how the proceeds will be used. This pamphlet is intended to provide guidance to the Temples, units, clubs and Nobles in their fundraising activities so there can be no criticism directed at them that the solicitation did not conform to the requirements of the law or was deceptive or misleading.

TYPES OF FUNDRAISERS

There are two types of Shrine fundraisers – Charitable and Fraternal.

CHARITABLE FUNDRAISERS – Where 100 percent of the net proceeds benefit Shriners Hospitals for Children.

FRATERNAL FUNDRAISERS – Where the net proceeds benefit the Temple, which in turn may distribute them as it sees fit. For example, profits may be disbursed to the Temple general fund, a building fund, to clubs and/or units, to Shriners Hospitals for Children, to local community or Masonic related projects (DeMolay, Masonic Home, etc.) or any combination thereof.

PROCEDURES THAT APPLY TO ALL SHRINE FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

All fundraising must comply with the law of the land; that is, the law of the jurisdiction where the activity takes place. This includes national, state or province, and local laws.

The use of the name Shriners Hospitals is governed by §503.10 of the bylaws of Shriners Hospitals.

All fundraising is governed by General Orders as may be issued on that subject by the Imperial Potentate.

Insurance. Your attention is particularly called to that portion of the existing General Order #1 pertaining to insurance. Strict compliance is required. All contracts must be reviewed and approved by the Temple Potentate after receiving the advice of the Temple attorney.

All fundraising promotional materials (including Temple publications) must include a statement indicating the major entity benefited by the funds [Statement of Purpose].

STATEMENTS OF PURPOSE

All fundraising promotional materials must contain a STATEMENT OF PURPOSE. Below are examples for each type of fundraising activity.

FOR CHARITABLE FUNDRAISERS:

“Net proceeds from this (activity, event, etc.) are for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children.”

FOR FRATERNAL FUNDRAISERS:

“Net proceeds from this (activity, event, etc.) are for the benefit of XYZ Temple/Unit/Shrine Club.”

DISCLOSURE (for Fraternal fundraisers) “Payments are not deductible as charitable contributions.”

*NOTE: All **fraternal** fundraising materials must include both the statement of purpose and disclosure.*

CHARITABLE FUNDRAISERS

It should be emphasized at this point that a Noble (in his capacity as a Shriner), a Shrine Temple/unit, an organization of Nobles, or affiliated/appendant corporations SHALL NOT engage in any charitable fundraising effort other than for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children.

When a decision is made to conduct a charitable fundraiser, the responsible Noble (club/unit president, committee chairman, etc...) must submit a written request to the Temple Potentate having jurisdiction thereof. If he approves, the Potentate must then obtain the written consent of the Imperial Potentate and Chairman of the Board of Trustees. This request shall be sent to the Executive Vice President – Imperial Council, Shriners International Headquarters, P.O. Box 31356, Tampa, Florida 33631-3356. Final approval for a charitable fundraising activity is effective upon the Temple's receipt of a Charity Activity Form. If a request is denied by the Imperial Potentate and Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Temple Potentate will receive a full explanation in writing.

One hundred percent of the net proceeds from charitable fundraisers must be given to Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Expenses for operating the event must be actual, and no labor charges can be made for volunteer work by Shriners and/or their families.

Under certain conditions, existing General Orders allow the use of a portion of funds raised for the hospitals to be used for patient transportation.

All solicitation materials, tickets, programs and documents must include factual information (Statement of Purpose) regarding use of the proceeds.

Information about our hospitals (obtainable from the Imperial Public Relations Department), such as patient success stories, facts and figures, photos or other appropriate material, may be used in programs for **charitable** fundraisers.

The Temple shall report the results of each charitable fundraising activity within 60 days of the activity to Shriners

Hospitals for Children on the Charity Activity Form provided to the Temple. A Temple that fails to remit the net proceeds within 60 days of the activity shall be assessed interest retroactive to the date of the activity.

The Temple shall maintain detailed financial records of all fundraising activities involving Nobles, clubs, units, organizations of Nobles or affiliated / appendant corporations for a period of seven years. Details of all revenues and disbursements shall be maintained in such financial records.

State Solicitation Laws: Some states have solicitation laws that may require Shrine compliance. Temples must have their attorney review such laws. By way of example, the State of Florida requires that the following statement be included in all printed solicitation materials, receipts, written confirmation, or reminders of contributions soliciting charitable contributions for Shriners Hospitals. The statement must be conspicuously displayed in all capital letters.

SHRINERS HOSPITALS FOR CHILDREN ARE DULY REGISTERED WITH THE STATE OF FLORIDA AS REQUIRED BY ITS SOLICITATION OF CONTRIBUTIONS ACT. THEIR REGISTRATION NUMBER IS CH 433. A COPY OF THE OFFICIAL REGISTRATION AND FINANCIAL INFORMATION MAY BE OBTAINED FROM THE DIVISION OF CONSUMER SERVICES BY CALLING TOLL-FREE 1-800-435-7352 WITHIN THE STATE. REGISTRATION DOES NOT IMPLY ENDORSEMENT, APPROVAL OR RECOMMENDATION BY THE STATE.

FRATERNAL FUNDRAISERS

A Noble (in his capacity as a Shriner), or a Shrine Temple/club/unit, or an organization of Nobles or affiliated/ appendant corporations must obtain the prior written consent of the Temple Potentate having jurisdiction thereof before engaging in any fundraising activity.

There can be no representation, express or implied, that the proceeds will be for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children.

When the Potentate gives his written consent for a fraternal fundraising activity, a copy of the same shall be mailed to the Executive Vice President – Imperial Council. Further, any printed materials pertaining to the fundraising activity shall be sent to Executive Vice President, Imperial Council if so requested.

All promotional material, tickets, programs and documents must contain a Statement of Purpose and Disclosure.

Information about our hospitals may be used in programs for fraternal fundraisers *provided that each contains the appropriate Statement of Purpose and Disclosure.*

This information must appear in conspicuous location used lettering bold enough to be easily read. Programs and other 'booklet' type materials must include the Statement of Purpose and Disclosure on the front cover or the first page. The Statement of

Purpose and Disclosure should also be included as a part of each fundraising activity advertised in Temple publications.

The Temple shall maintain detailed financial records of all fundraising activities involving Nobles, clubs, units, and organizations, of Nobles or affiliated/appendant corporations for a period of seven years. Details of all revenues and disbursements shall be maintained in such financial records.
